Prestininzi came out early in the season to work with the cast and to speak to the production crew. "They had such a strong connection and understanding of the text," he said. "I'm really excited to see them go deeper

Engle echoed the playwright's sentiment, referring to the cast as "a quartet of outstanding actors. Each of their voices weaves in and out of the play. (There are) moments of dissonance and harmony, and all of the possibilities you can have when you have four voices."

The question of ultimate chastity is, as the play's title would suggest, another key tension that moves the plot forward, one that Prestininzi describes as the conundrum of minds being encased by bodies and emotions. "Those are issues I find undergrads get on a very gut level," he

"I'm excited to see how that lands. I think one audience might take it to a very emotional place and another might take it in a place of high recognition. There are many ways you root for the young woman and other ways you are horrified at what youth can be. I think the audience will go back and forth with that. I'm very interested to see what will
