
their speed and passing skills,

"The goal for my team was to get Spencer the ball so he could make his first shot. When the ball came to him, everyone shouted to shoot it, but he missed. The whole crowd groaned," Verducci said. "Even the players from Stanley understood. When they received the rebound, they would pass it to Spencer because they wanted to be part of the moment also."

Finally after a few more failed attempts, the ball went in. "There was a huge roar from the crowd. It was like the 49ers had just won the Super Bowl."

After the season ended, Verducci created a program called "We Believe – Every Little Bit Helps," to bring that same excitement to more children with developmental disabilities. On Jan. 19, Verducci invited 19 children with special needs and their families to join him at Saint Mary's College for dinner, to cheer on the Gaels men's basketball team, and participate in the half-time free-throw program.

Word spread since then. Last Saturday, nearly 50 people donning "We Believe" tshirts attended the SMC game. Six volunteers helped out: four Saint Mary's students and two Campolindo High School students - including Jacob Moebius, a former OIS basketball player. "This is a chance for these children to do things every child should do," Verducci said. "We hope to take trips to San Francisco, Sacramento, go to science museums and have days in the park. We don't want to do just sports because not all the children are into sports."

Verducci donated the money for the tickets and tshirts for the first two events, and hopes to get financial support from local businesses in the future. The SMC athletic department gave Verducci discounted tickets and the SMC

food services director, Matt Carrol, provided the pre-game meal at no charge. "It showed me that Saint Mary's supports me 100 percent."

"I knew there was a need for programs for these children, but after the children and parents showed up for the first event, I realized how big the need was," Verducci said. "After the game I had a handful of parents just shaking my hand and asking how to join. They think I have touched these children's lives, but as I have learned, it is these children who have touched mine."

On Jan. 30, the OIS Bulldogs held their home opener and Verducci continued his tradition of inclusion. Two new players (both with special needs) sit among the others, uniforms on, ready to play.
