

"One of the reasons for this offering (the 10 percent discount) was to get people to commit early so the instructors have some level of comfort." Ingram remembers instances when camps had only three kids signed up a week and half before the start date and had to be canceled.

"Parents who wanted to sign started were disappointed that it was no longer offered," he said.
