SMC hosts colloquium on Title IX

niversary of Title IX. Passed in 1972, it changed the lives of female athletes. The Kinesiology department of Saint Mary's College June 11-14.

Claire Williams, Associate Professor of Kinesiology at SMC, noted the importance of continuing the discussion. "Although girls and women today participate in sports in unprecedented numbers, sport remains largely a male domain," she said. "Title IX's 40th anniversary provides an opportunity to celebrate and evaluate the status of girls and women in sport and the impact of the law on these opportunities."

Ten years after Title IX's passing, changes began to take place that were not merely symbolic. In fact, Title IX's real effects were examined in the later days of the colloquium which covered topics: Understanding and Analyzing Title IX's Requirements, Athletic Administration, and the Promise of Equality for Low Income Girls.

Title IX has made a difference: Wrynn and Smith emphasized that 2012 is the first year the Olympic Games will feature an equal number of competitions for male and female athletes.
